Dear Friends

We had to travel to Scotland to find Ian Prowse.

The musician from Liverpool didn't cross our paths when we were living in that amazing city but, on one of Karen's trips to our little house in Carradale, he was booked to play the village hall, thanks to a friend he had in the village. Karen went along and was a little impressed - to the point that when he played the Half Moon at Putney, she dragged me along. We had a great night! So much so that when we heard Ian Prowse was booked to play our village again, we made sure we were there. In fact, we saw him twice - once in Campbeltown where I very nearly became his support act due to the cancelling of a plane, and then in our village hall. After the gig, we had a long chat with him about our faith, which was meant to continue this weekend after he played the Jazz Cafe in Camden - a conversation we had to delay, but I know it will happen some time.

Before you think this is just a fan review, there is method in my message. At each gig, lan sings a song unaccompanied. Each time I hear it I get a little tearful, and it's really apt for this time of year. Called 'Lest We Forget', it's his take on songwriters Alun Rhys Jones' song, which tells the tale of the First World War (specifically the Battle of Ypres) and the calling up of the working men of Liverpool. This is no song of victory or celebration, but one of brutal honesty that is chilling...painful to hear.

War was never God's idea. It happens for multiple reasons from avarice and greed to power and a desire to possess. None of these things are found in the teachings or actions of Jesus, so shouldn't be in our thinking either. Those who use the Cross of Christ as an excuse to wage war are twisting the Gospel completely in the opposite direction Jesus intended. Thinking that we can use our faith to wage war, to force others to adopt our faith is not Love. Only one death was needed to bring salvation to the world and He has already been sacrificed for us.

We should never forget the mistakes of war - never forget those who have died in conflict, the members of the armed forces and the civilians. We should never forget but must do everything we can to ensure that it never happens again.

The Middle East, the Ukraine and all the other places of conflict have to be in our prayers, as should all who are affected by the loss and pain war brings. I hope you can join us at 10:45 am on Remembrance Sunday this year - it falls on Sunday 10th November - when the video of 'Lest We Forget' will be shared after the two minute silence. And may we remember while working to make war a thing of ancient history.

IRIS BEALE

With deep sadness, we record the homecall of our Life Deacon and Church Member, Iris Beale, on Thursday 24th October. One of Iris's final wishes was to stay at home and this was made possible under the loving care of her niece, Ruth, and her friend Johanna along with the support of other family members and friends and many wonderful medical attendants.

Born in May 1929 to Winifred and Harry Beale, Iris had a sister, Joyce, and two brothers, Arthur and Clive. Along with her siblings, Iris attended Sunday School and Girls Brigade serving as a Sunday School Teacher when she was 14, becoming a Church Member in May 1944 aged 15 and going through the leadership ranks of Girls' Brigade until she became Captain of the 38th London. She was also District Commandant and then Divisional Commissioner of the Wandsworth Division.

In her working life, Iris was a Primary and Infant School Teacher from 1951 until her retirement in 1989 – her final post was as Head of an Infant School in Thornton Heath, a position she held for 21 years!

Here at Earlsfield Baptist, Iris was elected to the Diaconate as a Deacon in 1973. She was Church Secretary from 1992 until the end of 2006 and was made a Life Deacon in January 2007.

Part of the Girls' Brigade Aim is 'to help girls become followers of the Lord Jesus Christ' and Iris was a wonderful role model to so many girls and shared her Christian love and faith with children in her care and with those who worked alongside her at different schools, in GB and here at EBC. Whether you knew Iris as Aunt, Great Aunt, Miss Beale, Captain or Iris, your life was blessed and enriched by knowing this true servant of Christ. Please keep Iris's family and friends in your prayers.

Iris's funeral will be held at Earlsfield Baptist Church on Monday, 18th November, at 12 noon. The service will be followed by interment at Wandsworth Cemetery at 1.30 pm and then refreshments back at the Church.

Dear Church Family and Friends
I must commence with a confession, albeit one which will come as no surprise to those who

know me; I simply LOVE Christmas!



Perhaps I have been blessed (in fact, I know that I have), but never have I experienced a 'bad' Christmas; not even the year that Lesley and I missed an entire Christmas Day by unintentionally sleeping throughout 25th December, as we had both been working at the theatre until Christmas Eve (THREE performances!) and were, thus, obliged to celebrate on Boxing Day, although not until after working the matinee performance (THE most chaotic and riotous of the year), of course. But, what a truly beautific smile greeted us, when Dad and I called round to check up on him the following morning and found him, as we had left him, tucked up in bed with his arms folded across his chest. We had all enjoyed a great family Christmas that year - not least Grandad, who, clearly, felt that even he would struggle to outshine himself in future years and that, perhaps, the time was right for him to take his leave of us, happily and peacefully – and with a full belly!

And, so, yes – I really DO love Christmas, which is why it saddens me to see empty church pews during this most joyous of festivals. Orrie's son, my father, Roy, was a quite exceptional sales and marketing man, whether it might be promoting a new line in frozen desserts, publicising a school play or 'getting the word out' for one of my 'business' ventures, Dad would always rise to the occasion; he had three basic rules for success:

Ah, yes. Dad's fourth 'rule' for maintaining a successful business: Personal recommendations. Given that we, as a church, have a great 'product', a high-profile shopfront and plenty of chimney pots surrounding us, perhaps we might be falling short on the 'personal recommendation' front?

But, as we approach the season of Advent and culminating in Christmas, what better time is there for us to gently remind some of those chimney pot owners that The Church is open for business? I know that 'spreading the word' might be difficult for some people, but, for what it is worth, I have never experienced a negative reaction when casually dropping in to a conversation with some random person a reference to my being connected with our local church; quite the opposite, in fact — although, having taken one look at me, they might, equally, just be at a loss for words, negative or otherwise! As I write this, at the beginning of October, I don't know what might be on offer at EBC throughout Advent and Christmas; I do hope that there will be many opportunities for us all to invite new friends into the church.

Which brings me on to my final point; and this one is from me – although I am proud to confirm that Dad approved it! As some of you might know, I spent a number of years working in the 'glamorous and exciting' world of popular entertainment, in which an old adage still prevails; that of 'being in the right place at the right time'. Utter rubbish. Being in the right place at the right time and BEING PREPARED is what actually matters.

Let us all be well prepared, this Christmas, for whatever we might be able to offer our chimney pot owners, both old and (God willing) new. I would, also, churn out yet another old epithet, 'One never gets a second chance to make a first impression', but that really would be a Christmas cracker motto too far, wouldn't it? I wish each and every one of you a Christmas filled with peace, joy, love and friendship – and keep counting those chimney pots!
